Public Hearing Update: Submissions to be Heard on Procedural Applications before Adjudicator Elizabeth Arnold-Bailey

Victoria – The Adjudicator appointed to preside over a Public Hearing into the conduct of seven Vancouver Police Department members, in connection with the death of Myles Gray on August 13, 2015, will hear submissions concerning several procedural matters at issue for this Public Hearing. These include applications to clarify the allegations of misconduct facing police and the potential use of transcripts from the Coroner’s Inquest.

The dates for these submissions are as follows:

- October 28, 2025
- November 13, 2025
- November 28, 2025

On each of these three dates, Adjudicator Arnold-Bailey will hear submissions in Room C485 at UBC Robson Street, Vancouver BC, starting at 9:30am.

About the OPCC and Public Hearings:

- The Police Complaint commissioner is a civilian, independent Officer of the Legislature overseeing complaints, investigations and discipline involving municipal police in British Columbia. For more on the OPCC, visit <https://opcc.bc.ca/about-us/>
- A Public Hearing is not limited to the evidence and issues canvassed at the discipline proceeding. The Police Complaint Commissioner can appoint Commission Counsel to act on their behalf during Public Hearings.

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- In a Public Hearing, a retired judge is appointed to sit as the Adjudicator and review the evidence, hear sworn testimony, and arrive at a decision of whether there is misconduct and if necessary, determine the corrective and/or disciplinary measures to be imposed. The retired judge's decision at a Public Hearing is final and conclusive.
- The appointed retired judge can also make recommendations to the Chief Constable or Police Board concerning any changes in policy or practice that the retired judge considers advisable.
